Subject:

Boundary and Road Right-of-Way Decisions Re Tetlin Indian Reservation.

As an outgrowth of a meeting held in my office on March 7, on Alaska road right-of-way problems, another meeting was held on March 8 concerning special problems of road right-of-ways and boundaries of the Tetlin Indian Reserve. Those present were Messrs. R. C. Price (Chairman); J. M. Dwight; Theodore Hass; T. W. Wheat; J. M. Brown; Kenneth J. Kadow; Joseph T. Flakne, Robert K. Coote, Earl G. Harrington, and James A. Lanigan.

A draft memorandum dated March 16, 1949, was prepared, outlining the conclusions reached, and this was circulated for review to the Bureau of Indian Affairs, Eureau of Land Management, Division of Territories, Alaska Field Staff, and the National Park Service. Following that review, the memorandum has been appropriately modified with reference to conclusions (c) and (e) as the basis of Departmental policy on this matter.

It was concluded at the meeting on March 8 that it would be highly desirable from the Department's point of view to set new boundaries for the Tetlin Indian Reserve. The following suggestions were made:

- (a) It should be bounded on the west by a line on the east side of the Tok-Salina Highway, 150 feet from the center line.
- (b) It should be bounded on the north by a line on the couth side of the Alaska Highway, 300 feet from the center line.

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- (c) Land lost by Tetlin Indians on the west of the Tok-Saline Highway and on the north of the Alaska Highway should be exchanged for other lands south or east of the Tetlin Reserve on a comparable value basis and so far as possible, on an acre for acre basis.
- (d) Special use permits of the outer 150 feet on the south side of the Alaska Highway bordering the Tetlin Reserve shall be issued by the Bureau of Land Management only with the permission of the duly constituted representatives of the peoples of the Tetlin Reserve.
- (e) It was agreed that the above objectives would solve most effectively all the problems of the Department with regard to the highway right-of-ways, would simplify surveys, and reduce materially the cost of running them. However, it was also agreed that the wishes of the peoples of the Tetlin Reserve must be ascertained on the above proposals and their counter proposals discussed before final action is taken.

I fully concur with the above expressions and request the Bureau of Indian Affairs to take immediate steps through the Alaska Native Service to ascertain the views of the Tetlin Indians on the above proposals. If they agree, the Bureau of Land Management should determine as soon as possible the new boundaries of the Tetlin Reserve and take whatever steps are necessary with the Alaska Road Commission to establish properly the titles for the Tok-Salina and Alaska Highways as they relate to the Tetlin Reserve.

In response to the point made by Acting Commissioner Zimmerman in his memorandum of April 5 on the above subject, I have deleted from the attached memorandum the reference to the manner of negotiations.

I wish that you would have in mind that the Department has an obligation to protect the rights of the Indians and that the Department, in its disposition of the public domain, has an obligation to protect the public property. In this Departmental proposal, both should be kept fully in mind as we work out a solution for the boundaries of the Tetlin Indian Reserve.

There will be provision made necessarily for the location of proper ingress roads and consequently it has not seemed necessary to add such a provision to the basic memorandum.

Dear Joe:

Your letters of April 21, 1949, to Hon. Rod Davis, Mayor of Metlakahtla, and to Mr. James C. Curry of Washington, D. C., regarding the proposed Annette Island road, have come to hand.

A few weeks ago Mr. Davis and Mr. Ziegler visited my office together and the situation regarding the proposed road was fully explained to them. I told them that we were prepared to make a survey to determine the cost and advisability of the proposed road and that this was only being held up awaiting action of the town of Metlakehtla in agreeing to furnish the necessary right-of-way for the road. So far, nothing has been heard from Mr. Davis, Mr. Ziegler, or the town of Metlakahtla on this subject. I told them exactly what width would be required; namely, 200 feet.

If they will agree to the right-of-way, there is no reason why the survey cannot be made this summer. Construction might then follow in due course. If, however, they will not get busy and give us the right-of-way, it is probable that they will have no road.

It is exasperating to have these prople take the matter up with Washington when they have not fulfilled their obligations here. I think they understand perfectly what they have to do, and, as I mentioned before, Mr. Ziegler was in my office at the meeting with Mr. Davis. Just exactly what his object was in asking you for further information, I cannot tell; but at least you told his the right thing.

The Division of Textitories and Island Possessions agrees with the recommendations for action on the above subject contained in your memorandum of March 16. We wish to urge that the necessary action be undertaken as soon as possible in view of the fact that a long delay in reaching a solution to this problem will work to the detriment of all concerned, Natives and Whites alike.

It hardly seems necessary to add the subsection suggested by Mr. Zimmerman with respect to permitting the construction of ingress and egress roads and trails. It does not seem at all probable that there will be any difficulty in arranging for such roads at any suitable point whenever the need may occur.

Subject: Alaska Road Right-of-way Problems.

Pursuant to a discussion in my office Eonday afternoon, March 7, on the above subject, attended by Hessrs. Clawson, Coots, Flakne, Province, Brown, Wirth, Demaray, Price, Kadow and myself, the following conclusions were reached.

- 1. The Alaska Read Commission will be responsible for the administration and care of all reads up to 150-feet from center line.
- 2. Road right-of-ways in excess of 150-feet from the denter line will be administered by the Bureau of Land Management on the basis of special use permits.
- 3. There are to be no special use permits granted on any highway that does not have a right-of-way in excess of 300-feet.
- 4. It is agreed that the Tok and Haines Highways will be reduced from their present width to 300-feet.
- 5. The Alaska Highway will be maintained at 600-feet through the (Tetland) Indian Reservation. Er. Kadow will work with the proper officials in the Indian Service and the Bureau of Land Management to effect a complete title transfer of right-of-way to the Alaska Road Commission. It is understood that Indians of the Tetland Reservation will be given prior consideration regarding special use permits along the Alaska Highway in the Reservation.
- 6. The Bureau of Land Management shall draw up immediately and make available in printed form the detailed regulations governing special permits along the highway.



- 7. Alaska Road Commission in cooperation with the Bureau of Land Management, Park Service, and Territorial Highway officials will draw up immediately and make available in printed form the rules and regulations concerning billboards and other road right-of-way use considerations.
- 8. The boundaries of the Tetland Indian Reservation will be reviewed by Bureau of Land Management, Indian Service, and Mr. Price, Mr. Flakne, and Mr. Kadow as soon as possible. Recommendations for further consideration will be made by them.

The above conclusions should be regarded as departmental policy and, consequently, the agencies involved should notify their field organizations and take any other steps that are necessary to bring about proper and immediate action.

Delegate Bartlett's letter of February 22, 1949, rehighway rights of way in Alaska.

On February 22, 1949, Delegate Bartlett addressed to the Secretary a rather intemperate letter commenting on rights of way for roads in Alaska. In addition, he sent a copy of the letter to each of the persons addressed in this memorandum.

I wanted to let you know that the Department has given full consideration to views expressed within the Territory by the Alaska Field Committee, by the heads of appropriate bureaus in Washington, and other expressions. As a result, it has been determined by the Department that rights of way for highways in Alaska shall be as follows:

Alaska Highway - 600 ft.
Other primary roads - 300 ft.
Secondary roads - 200 ft.
Feeder and branch roads - 100 ft.

I wanted you to know that the thorough consideration suggested above has been given and that a Departmental decision has been reached.

Pour Kens With respect to your letter of Jeneary 11 concerning the moter of rights-of-may for Alaska highways, I think there is somewhat of a minumierstanding as to procedures. It is true, as you were notified, that a decision was reached concerning the widths of rights-of-way that would be put into effect. This decision represented the Espartment's views and as such is, of course, binding on everyone in the Department. However, such a decision must be followed up and be sade effective by formal action. In this case, it was agreed that the

The authority to make public land orders roots with the Socretary upon delegation of authority from the Freedont. The authority has not been delegated further. Accordingly, no masters of the Aleska Field Consisted have the authority to make such a public land order.

rights-of-may would be established by a public land order.

I am quite certain that neither Auckatt nor Koyas questions the authoritative character of the decision resched with respect to the widths of rights-of-way. Also I do not see how they could be pussled no to what action was required, of them, especially since Puckett is well aware that a public land order must be provolgated before the action becomes official.

The public land order is now being drafted. Before it can be signed by the Secretary and sent to the Federal Register for publication it must first be approved at several levels in the Department and approved by the Bureau of the Budget and the Attorney General. Since this process sometimes takes considerable time and results in modifications along the way, it may be preseture at this time to assounce the establishment of rights-of-way as a definite fact. This, of course, is something different from the assouncement of Departmental policy with respect to the establishment of rights-of-way.

As to the "fairly delicate problem;" I think that we might have a two-way approach. When the occasion arises I shall send you a written instructive, outlining particular assignments. On the other hand, you

may realise that action along a particular line is required, and under such circumstances, I suggest that you write for my signature a meso-randum addressed to yourself containing the particular instructions that appear necessary.



Subject: Reservation of Right-of-way for Roads in Alaska.

You have referred to me, by your memorandum of December 14, an inquiry from the Commissioner of Roads for Alaska asking whether the Act of July 24, 1947 (Pub. Law 229, 80th Cong., 48 U.S.C., 1946 Ed., Supp. I, 32ld), requiring the reservation of a right-of-way for roads, etc., "in all patents for lands hereafter taken up, entered, or located in the Territory of Alaska," applied only to lands filed upon since the date of the Act.

While I shall not attempt to discuss every type of land disposal made in Alaska, it is my opinion that requirement of Public Law 229 does not apply where either a valid settlement or a valid filing leading to a patent has been made prior to the date of the Act on lands open to settlement or to such filing. Thus the deciding factor will not necessarily be the date of filing. This Bureau, of course, will decide at the time a patent is issued in each case whether or not the reservation should be inserted.

My dear Colonel Noyes:

We have discussed with the Bureau of Land Management your letter of January 3, regarding action on rights-of-way withdrawals for Alaska roads, and have been advised as follows:

It is proposed that a public land order be issued which will designate the Alaska Road Commission as the agency which will define the categories into which the various roads fall. In setting up classifications there should be some provision for future roads.

The preparation of the necessary land order is receiving consideration in the Bureau of Land Management. As soon as it is signed, you should be prepared to give public notice designating the roads that fall into the various classifications with their rights-of-way widths. Until the order is signed and becomes effective, it is suggested that no publicity be given as to the action contemplated, and that no action be taken by you.

The foregoing applies only to roads under the jurisdiction of the Secretary of the Interior, and does not include roads in Matienal Forests nor military reservations.


The letter and attached memorandum do not seem to be sufficiently authenticated to permit me to take any action in the field.


The 1947 Act providing for road reservation in patents for lands in the Territory (U.S.C. Title 48, Sec. 321d) provides:

"In all patents for lands hereafter taken up, entered, or located in the Territory of Alaska, and in all deeds by the United States hereafter conveying any lands to which it may have reacquired title in said Territory not included within the limits of any organized municipality, there shall be expressed that there is reserved, from the lands described in said patent or deed, a right-of-way thereon for roads, roadways, highways, tramways, trails, bridges, and appurtenant structures constructed or to be constructed by or under the authority of the United States or of any State created out of the Territory of Alaska."

The wording of the act would seem to indicate that it is applicable only to lands since filed upon, and would have no application to lands previously filed upon although patent had not yet been issued. Will you kindly obtain clarification on this point, either from the Solicitor or the Bureau of Land Management.

Rights-of-way for Alaska Highways - Summary of Recommendations.

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At the time the question of the right-of-way width of the Alaska Highway was up for consideration the National Park Service recommended a width of 600 feet, which was subsequently adopted. At that time the Eureau of Land Hanagement (General Land Office) recommended a width of 330 feet for the Alaska Highway.

While uniform rights-of-way for other highways in Alaska were discussed from time to time, no specific recommendations covering all classes of reads were ever put together in one place. The National Furk Service at one time recommended a 400-foot width for all other roads. The Bureau of Land Management had recommended 200 feet for main highways, other than the Alaska Highway, and 100 feet for secondary roads.

Immediate consideration was given to this matter by the Alaska Field Committee scontafter it was organized. A Subcommittee on Highways was appointed to study the matter, this Subcommittee consisting of A. C. Kuehl, MPS; Lowell W. Puckett, BLM; and John R. Noyes, ARC. Hesers. Kuehl and Puckett recommended in a verbal report to the Alaska Field Committee that the following widths for rights-of-way be adopted:

Colonal Noyes made a minority report favoring a width of 300 feet or less for Class 1 highways.

The Alaska Field Committee rejected the Subcommittee's report in favor of the following widths:

Through and feeder roads 200-Foot right-of-way Local roads 100 " " " "

Mr. Stoddart, Division Engineer, and Mr. Wyller, District Engineer of the Public Roads Administration, expressed themselves as being in favor of the rights-of-way recommended by Colonel Royes, namely, 300, 200, and 100 feet, respectively, for through, feeder, and local roads.

Subsequent to the foregoing action, the Subcommittee of Mesers. Kuehl, Fuckett, and Noyes met again and submitted a unanimous report recommending rights-of-way of 300, 200, and 100 feet for through, feeder and local roads, respectively.

<u>Collateral Matters</u>. The Field Committee is opposed to the granting of special land use permits for the use of lands within rights-of-way of 300 feet

The Subcommittee adopted the Alaeka Road Commission's classification of highways as through roads, feeder roads, and local roads.



Gentlemen:

In line with our recent telephone conversation relative to the right of way widths along the public highways of the Territory, it is my opinion, based upon personal observation of the conditions as I found them in the field, that too much could not be said in favor of a maximum variable width of from one hundred to an extreme of two hundred feet. Most of the territory traversed by our highways is through barren untillable terrain, which only the existence of those highways makes valuable.

If we are to promote the advancement of our Territory, it is paramount that we meet every desire of the prospective settler and make it as easy and attractive for him as possible to take up land along our highways. If the conditions are so severe as to make him stay back an eighth of a mile from the center line, we are defeating the very ends for which the roads were originally built: the development of the Territory. No one will build so far back from the road and be expected to keep that strip of government land cleared.

The Canadian Government is doing everything in its power to induce settlement along their stretch of the Alcan Highway and I think the American Government should do the same or better.

I would not recommend a standard maximum blanket width of any given dimension for the entire Territory as that would entail hardships in many instances. I think a land classification should be made and a program flexible enough to meet the conditions as found in the field, but in no case would I recommend a right of way over 200 feet, and where the value of the land justifies it, only 66 feet.
