Meanwhile, The Alaska Railroad and Associated General Contractors announced jointly that working requirements on the project have been revised in the interest of fostering safety.

A plea to a sensible approach to the safety program without work stoppage, was made by Moore early this week on the heels of Benson's wire to Interior Secretary Oscar Chapman. The contractors representative expressed his approval of the Interior Department decision not to enforce a work stoppage on the vital railroad-highway project.

The new safety program is to be accelerated, Moore pointed out. Various modifications were incorporated to meet conditions peculiar to Turnagain Arm work.



Upon receiving your telegram transmitting Commissioner of Labor Benson's I tried to reach Colonel Johnson by 'phone. I found that he will not be available until tomorrow. Meanwhile I have forwarded him a copy of your telegram.

Without knowing just exactly what the circumstances which Benson refers to are, you must remember that we are now in a political campaign and Mr. Benson as a Republican candidate for Commissioner of Labor would not hesitate to do anything he could to discredit the present administration. It was he who a year or two ago made a public release referring to the condition of servitude under which the Pribilof Island natives were forced to exist by the Department of the Interior. The wording of this telegram has a strong political fragrance and may be no more justified than Commissioner Benson's previous blast concerning the Pribilof Islands.

However, I shall urge Colonel Johnson to go into the matter promptly and thoroughly and to take any steps and measures that are possible to improve safety conditions on the Alaska Railroad. I am sure that Colonel Johnson is fully aware of conditions that exist and I know that he has been working actively to improve safety conditions.

In compliance with your request of April 18, 1950, below is report of our Safety Engineer Carl E. Steeves on the explosion at mile 78.2:

"Explosion occurred on North side of track at Alaska Railroad Mile Post 78.2 at 9:20 a.m., April 15, 1950.

Max J. Kuney Company contractor on the work.

Caused by premature dynamite explosion. Reason unknown.

Four men fatally injured:

John K. Skoglund, Powder Foreman, 61 years old, about 30 years powder experience.

Benjamin F. Wilson, Powderman helper, 55 years old.

Daniel Stabenow, Wagon drill operator, 35 years old.

Ed O. Bumgarner, Wagon drill helper, 46 years old.

Due to the fact the only men in close proximity to the explosion were killed, the cause of this explosion is unknown.

Holes had been drilled over an area approximately 200 feet long by 20 feet wide. The four men fatally injured were in the process of charging these holes. At the time of the accident there were approximately 35 holes charged with about 50 pounds of 60 per cent dynamite per hole.

The railroad track was covered for a distance of 100 feet with approximately 10 feet of debris by the blast. Train service was delayed for about $3\frac{1}{2}$ hours.

Neither the contractor nor the Bureau of Public Roads had a Safety Engineer on this job. $^{\rm H}$

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



My dear Mr. Secretary:

An examination has been made of the title data relating to 2.185 acres of land, more or less, Alaska Road Commission Project, in Anchorage Recording District, Third Judicial Division, Territory of Alaska. This land is to be acquired for a consideration of \$190.00 by authority of existing legislation. The file number of this Department is 33-2-130.

The land is described in the enclosed deed dated Movember 23, 1949, executed by James J. Delaney and Mancy M. Delaney, busband and wife, to the United States of America.

The abstract, consisting of 9 pages, was last satisfactorily certified as of November 25, 1949, by Davis & Nenfrew, Abstracters.

The abstract and accompanying data disclose the title to be vested in James J. Delaney and Mancy M. Delaney, subject to:

- 1. All taxes and assessments.
- Rights or claims of persons in possession, if any, not shown of record.
- Mechanics' liens, if any, not shown of record.
- h. Easements for roads, highways and public utilities, if any, not shown of record.
- 5. Rights of the United States and third persons, if any, under reservations contained in the patent shown at page 1 of the abstract.

- 6. Easements, if any, used by third persons in connection with vested and accrued water rights.
- 7. Rights of the United States under the enclosed deed.
- 8. The registration of the land with the Territorial Assessor for the Third Division, Territory of Alaska, under the 1919 Session Laws of Alaska.

As a copy of the option was not submitted to this Department, the consideration for the purchase is not stated herein.

Prior to the consummation of this purchase it should be determined that the deed to the United States and the caption to the abstract include all the land described in the option.

When the above requirement and objections numbered 1, 2, and 8 have been met, the enclosed deed to the United States, properly stamped, has been recorded, the purchase price has been paid, the abstract has been continued and certified to a date subsequent to the recordation of the deed, disclosing that nothing has occurred since the date of the present certificate to affect the title adversely, and showing the vesting of a valid title in the United States of America, and this Department has been informed in writing that objections 4, 5 and 6 will not interfere with the contemplated use of the land, the title will be approved subject to the rights and easements referred to in objections 4, 5 and 6.

The abstract and related papers are enclosed.

Reference is made to Junds advanced to the Alaska Railroad by the Alaska Road Commission for payment of contracts on the Turnagain Arm Project.
