



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My dear Delegate Bartlett:

· On November 15 you wrote to the Director of the Bureau of Land Management concerning rights-of-way for highway purposes in Alaska, calling attention to certain problems which were believe to result from the promulgation of Public Land Order 601. This matter of rights-of-way for Alaskan highways is an important one, to JAN - 4 1950 which I have given my personal attention both here and in Alaska last fall. It was the subject of discussion at the meeting of the Alaska

Field Committee at McKinley Park, September 21 to 23, and has been more fully considered recently in the Department. After weighing all the reasons advanced for continuation, modification, or revocation of JAN 4- 1950the withdrawal, I am firmly convinced that the proper action was taken

SOLICITOR . in withdrawing lands for highway purposes by means of Public Land Order 601.

Granted that the withdrawal may add a little to the work FROM SOLICION the Bureau of Land Management and the Alaska Road Commission, I feel that the benefits greatly outweigh the disadvantages. No one JAN 6-1950s questioned the need for rights-of-way for the highways of Alaska. FOR SIGNATURE question has been simply as to how the rights-of-way should be

reserved, that is, whether the rights-of-way should be withdrawn, as has been done, or whether an easement should be reserved. Those who have questioned the withdrawals have done so on two grounds: (1) that JAN 10 1950 divisions on both sides of the highway, and (2) that the withdrawal

closes the right-of-way to all use except for highway purposes. RECEIVED

I realize that the withdrawal does create fractional parts of legal subdivisions and the need for confining homesteads to one side 0000 JAN 1 0 1950 OFFICE ATTOM

way. However, I do not believe that this situation is of sufficient importance to justify abandoning the withdrawal. So far as administrative action is concerned I have directed the Bureau of Land Management and the Alaska Road Commission to accelerate their survey work so that these fractional subdivisions will be lotted and made available for inclusion in homestead entries. Neither do I believe that any particular disservice will be dong the individual entrymen JAN 1 1 1950 because their entries are limited to one side of a highway. This limitation will result in a wider distribution of road frontage. You, of course, are well aware of the premium at which road access is

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held in Alaska. Many settlers have asked why the amount of road frontage that any one settler can take up is not limited. They want to see their communities grow and they realize that there must be accessible land for new settlers.

It may be that entries should be allowed to cross farm or local road rights-of-way even though restricted to one side of main roads. This is being considered.

There is another point in favor of the withdrawal method of creating rights-of-way which is little realized. If the right-ofway is created by a withdrawal, then any entry is computed up to the right-of-way. In other words, an entryman may take a maximum of 160 acres adjoining one side of the highway right-of-way. Nothing is deducted for the right-of-way. However, if the rights-of-way are created as easements, then a homestead or other entry would be taken subject to that easement. In the case of an entry crossing the Alaska Highway, for instance, a half-mile square 160-acre homestead would be subject to a minimum easement of 36 acres. If the highway ran through in a diagonal manner, the easement would amount to more. Other rights-of-way, were they easements, would take lesser amounts of the homestead.

Now as to the apprehensions that the land within the rightsof-way would be closed to all use, we will as a matter of policy allow the land within the withdrawn strip to be used by the public for all reasonable purposes not inconsistent with the construction and operation of the highway and appurtenances. This policy has been in effect for some time with respect to the Alaska Highway.

I am sure that you are in complete agreement as to the need for creating rights-of-way for the highways of Alaska. All of the States are now faced with the problem of acquiring additional lands for highway purposes and are in many instances paying for the lack of foresight as to their highway needs. In making the withdrawal of rights-of-way by Public Land Order 601 there were considered not only the current requirements but also the highway needs of the future State of Alaska.

Subject: Withdrawals for rights-of-way in Alaska

I have your letter of November 25 calling to my attention WHITENOR DEPT. your memorandum of the same date to Director Clawson concerning the JAN 4- 1950 contiguity of lands affected by withdrawals for rights-of-way in Alaska. BOLICITOR

Recently I took this subject of highway rights-of-way up in a meeting with representatives of your Bureau and with from solicit Colonel Noyes. At that time there were presented to me again the JAN 6-195 several arguments against a withdrawal for highway purposes and . EOR SIGNATURATE arguments for easements in lieu of a withdrawal. These were very much the same as those advanced at the meeting of the Alaska INTERIOR DEPT. Field Committee in McKinley Park last fall. SECRETARY'S MAIL CENTER

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I consider a withdrawal for the establishment of highway JAN 10 1950 rights-of-way as being preferable to an easement. I am not disturbed that entries must be limited to one side of the road by reason of the withdrawal. On the contrary, considering the premium placed on road frontage in the Territory, I consider this to be a JAN 10 1950drawals will unduly increase administrative difficulties. Granted OFFICE OF that it will be necessary to survey and lot some of the fractional subdivisions on both sides of the road, I believe that the Bureau of Land Management can handle this problem.

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In withdrawing rights-of-way for road purposes I am convinced that we are on firm ground. The protests have fallen into two main categories: (1) that the right-of-way withdrawal leaves fractional parts of legal subdivisions on both sides of the highway, and (2) that the withdrawal closes the right-of-way for all uses except for highway purposes. As to the first problem, I have asked the Bureau of Land Management and the Alaska Road Commission to work out a program so that we can locate the roads and survey the adjoining lands as quickly as possible. As to the contention that the rights-of-way will be closed to all use, I see no reason why as a matter of policy we should not allow the land within the withdrawn strip to be used for all reasonable purposes not inconsistent with the construction and operation of the highways and appurtenances. We have been pursuing such a policy in administering the Alaska Highway withdrawal. Certainly there would be no objection to permitting flumes and ditches on the rights-of-way as might be required by the mining industry.

With examples on all sides of lack of foresight in estimating the future needs for highways in the States, it would be shirking our responsibility to the Territory and the future State of Alaska if we fail to provide now for highway right-of-way requirements.

As the result of the conference held in your office on Friday December 9 concerning the administration of the areas in Alaska reserved for highway purposes, we propose to proceed, as follows:

- 1. The areas reserved for roads will continue to be administered as withdrawn areas in accordance with the provisions of Public Land Order 601 dated August 10, 1949.
- 2. The withdrawn rights-of-way will make it mandatory to restrict entries to include areas located only on one side of a road, as lands in entries must be contiguous.
- The Bureau of Land Management will determine the 3. center lines of the constructed roads in those areas which have been previously surveyed under the rectangular system of surveys and where title is still in the Government, in order that supplemental plats may be prepared to show areas and designations for the public lands bordering on the rights-of-way.
- The Bureau of Land Management, in executing new cadastral surveys will, where necessary, determine the center 4. lines of the constructed roads as the proper basis for platting them through the sections. The plats representing the cadastral surveys will give the areas and designations of the lands abutting on the withdrawn area.
- 5. The Alaska Road Commission will reimburse the Bureau of Land Management for the cost of the field work in those cases where it is necessary to determine the center lines of the constructed highways as the basis for computing the areas of the public lands adjacent to the reserved area for highway purposes.

6. The Alaska Road Commission will proceed as rapidly as possible to prepare maps of definite locations for all constructed roads in Alaska and file copies of those maps with the Regional Administrator, Bureau of Land Management, at Anchorage, Alaska.

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

Public Land Order 601

ALASKA

RESERVING Withdrawing public lands for highway purposes

Par #1.

By virtue of the authority vested in the President and pursuant to Executive Order No. 9337 of April 24, 1943, it is ordered as follows:

Subject to valid existing rights and to existing surveys and withdrawals for other than highway purposes, the public lands in Alaska lying within 500 feet on each side of the center line of the Alaska Highway, 150 feet on each side of the center line of the other through roads, 100 feet on each side of the center line of the feeder roads, and 50 feet on each side of the center line of the local roads, according to the following classifications, are hereby withdrawn from all forms of appropriation under the public land laws, including the mining and mineral-leasing laws, and reserved for highway purposes:

Executive Order No. 9115 of April 23, 1912, reserving public lands for the use of the Alaska Road Commission in connection with the construction, operation and maintenance of the Palmer-Richardson Highway (now known as the Glenn Highway), is hereby revoked. Public Land Order No. 386 of July 31, 1947, is hereby revoked so far as it affects the withdrawal, for highway purposes, of the following-described lands:

- (a) A strip of land 600 feet wide, 300 fest on each side of the center line of the Alaska Highway (formerly the Canadian Alaska Military Highway) as constructed from the Alaska-Yukon Territory boundary to its junction with the RichardsonnHighway near Big Delta, Alaska.
- (b) A strip of land 600 feet wide, 500 feet on each side of the center line of the Gulkana-Slana-Tok Road as constructed from Tok Junction at about Mile 1319 on the Alaska Righway to the junction with the Richardson Highway near Gulkana, Alaska.

Note Respect to the Law Bs Released By The Revocations The lands affected by the revocation of Executive Order No. 1482 BY THIS ORDER AND NOT REWINDRAWN BY IT 9115, supra, and those described in paragraph (a) above affected by the partial revocation of Public Land Order No. 386 are rewithdrawn as provided in the second paragraph of this order. The lands described in paragraph (b) above are rewithdrawn to the extent of 150 feet on each side of the center line (Tok Cut-Off) as provided

in the second paragraph of this order and are released from the reservation made by Public Land Order No. 586 as to the lands between 150 and 300 feet on each side of the center line. order shall become effective as to such released lands at 10:00 hereof. of this order. At that time, a.m. on the 35th day after the date of SUCH RELEASED LANDS subject to ratid existing rights, the unreserved, unappropriated, all of subject to valid existing rights, public lands, which are all unsurveyed, shall, be opened to settlement under the homestead laws and the homesite act of May 26, 1934, 48 Stat. 809 (48 USC 461) only, and to that form of appropriation only by qualified veterans of World War II and other qualified persons entitled to preference under the set of September 27, 1944

asamened 58 Stat. 747, (45 U.S.C. 279-284), as smended. Commencing at 10:00 a.m. on the 126th day after the date of this order, any of such lands not settled upon by veterans shall become subject to settlement and other forms of appropriation by the public generally in accordance with the appropriate laws and regulation.

My dear Mr. Stepler:

This is in reply to your letter of July 9 in which you mak whether the Department's regulations with respect to the width of the right of vey required in connection with road construction in Alaska sight be smended or suspended in connection with the new road on Annotte Island. We note your statement that the Town Council of Metlakahtla would prefer not to grant a right of way of 200 feet by this read unless it is absolutely assessary.

The Department has established a policy with respect to the required width of the right of way for different types of reads in Alaska. The read on Annette Island comes within the category of those for which a 200-feet right of way is required. The fact that it will pees through valuable timber is not cufficient justification to warrant an amendment or suspension of this requirement, inarmab as the timber and other resources in the right of way area will not be lost to the Metlakahtlas. Accordingly, I feel that it would be unnecessary and unwise to make any exception to the Department's policy in this respect.

Responsibility for the handling of road constructionhas been delegated to Golonel John R. This office has no information on the proposed highway on Annette Island except that contained in Mr. Zeigler's letter and the Department's proposed reply.

On the merits of the issue, my opinion would not be worth much, but it does seem that the right-of-way for a road on Annette Island need not be as wide as that for the Alaska Highway. Furthermore, in dealing with the problem on Annette Island, the Road Commission seeks to use privately-owned Indian land whereas most of the right-of-way for the Alaska Highway is public domain.

In any event my suggestion is that Mr. Zeigler be told that he, has attorney for the Metlakatla Indians, should consult with Superintendent Foster and Col. Noyes in an effort to reach agreement. In the absence of any statement from Mr. Foster, I am unwilling to surname the proposed letter.

In your memorandum of July 22 you suggest that the right-of-way for a road on Annette Island should not need to be as great as that for the Alaska Highway. I know you will be glad to learn that it is not, and that required right-of-way for the Annette Island road will be 200 feet and will not be as great as the 600 feet for the Alaska Highway. The maintenance of an adequate right-of-way on a highway running through Indian land is just as important for the protection of the Indians as is the maintenance of an adequate right-of-way on non-Indian lands for the protection of others.

Having discussed this matter with Assistant Secretary Warne there is no objection to having Mr. Zeigler, as attorney for the Metlakahtlas' lands, consult with Superintendent Foster and Colonel Noyes in connection with the proposed highway, and the letter has been modified appropriately in connection with that suggestion; however, Assistant Secretary Warne does not want any chiseling on the established right-of-way policy of the Department.

> The draft now submitted defines through moads, feeder roads, and local roads, and the provision in a previous draft for determination by the Alaska Road Commission as to what portion of such roads shall be designated as belonging to the respective classes, and the publication of such determination has been omitted.

Also submitted is the draft of a notice allowing 60 days for the filing of objections to the withdrawal.

It is recommended that the letter to the Director, Bureau of the Budget, be signed.

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

I am asking Reg to arrange a conference to include the Public Roads Administration and Rex Lee as soon as practicable so that the Public Roads Administration may be enlightened as to the nature of the bill and so that the matter may be discussed in advance of the hearing.

Pursuant to a discussion in my office Monday afternoon, March 7, on the above subject, attended by Messrs. Clawson, Coote, Flakne, Province, Brown, Wirth, Demaray, Price, Kadow and myself, the following conclusions were reached.

- 1. The Alaska Road Commission will be responsible for the administration and care of all roads up to 150-feet from center
- 2. Road right-of-ways in excess of 150-feet from the center line will be administered by the Bureau of Land Management on the basis of special use permits.
- 3. There are to be no special use permits granted on any highway that does not have a right-of-way in excess of 300-feet.
- 4. It is agreed that the Tok and Haines Highways will be reduced from their present width to 300-feet.
- 5. The Alaska Highway will be maintained at 600-feet through the Tetland Indian Reservation. Mr. Kadow will work with the proper officials in the Indian Service and the Bureau of Land Management to effect a complete title transfer of right-of-way to the Alaska Road Commission. It is understood that Indians of the Tetland Reservation will be given prior consideration regarding special use permits along the Alaska Highway in the Reservation.

The above conclusions should be regarded as departmental policy and, consequently, the agencies involved should notify their field organizations and take any other steps that are necessary to bring about proper and immediate action.

As a result, it has been determined by the Department that rights of way for highways in Alaska shall be as follows:

> Alaska Highway 600 ft. Other primary roads 300 ft. 200 ft. Secondary roads Feeder and branch roads 100 ft.

As a result of a lengthy discussion on the roads rights-of-way problem in Alaska, the following decisions were unanimously reached by the members of the Alaska Field Committee at the meeting held on February 15, 16, and 17:

1. A radiogram was sent immediately to you with the unanimous recommendation of the Committee.

A radiogram was sent immediately to you with the unanimous recommendation of the Committee as follows: "Re highway rights-of-way in Alaska, it is unanimous recommendation of Alaska Field Committee that new orders being drafted amend PLO 386 so width of Slana Tok right-of-way may be reduced to 300 feet and PLO 226 Haines Highway be revoked so right-of-way may be reduced from one mile to 300 feet. Both of these roads have been designated by the Alaska Road Commission as through roads."
- 2. The Committee again recommended that no special use permits be issued on roads under 300 feet and approval of this as Departmental policy be given.
- 3. The Committee recommended that the Alaska Road Commission be given complete jurisdiction over all Alaska highways controlled by the Interior Department up to 150 feet on each side of the center line, the additional 300 feet on the Alaska Highway being subject to lease, should be controlled by the Bureau of Land Management and all leases made by them.

My dear Mr. Secretary:

I appreciate the opportunity afforded by your invitation of February 10 to comment on the department's proposal that the width of right-of-way for roads in Alaska should be as follows:

Alaska Highway 600 feet Other primary Roads 500 feet Secondary Roads 200 feet Feeder and Branch Roads 100 feet

The proposal is simply fantastic. If adopted it would push the would-be settler back as if he were not wanted in Alaska. It would in many cases push him up a mountain, over a cliff, or into a stream or lake. It would multiply the difficulties which for him are very considerable already. It would present problems in driveway construction, maintenance, snow clearance and in the obtaining of driveway permits through your right-of-way in the first place. (Don't try to tell any Alaskan who has had dealings with the department that there would not be red tape and delay in connection with that.) It would be an open invitation to trespass.

And for what? I confess I am unable to think of a single good reason for tying up all this territory right where we want people, accommodations for travelers, service facilities, etc. I drove to Alaska over the Alaska Highway last summer and am willing to testify that, even from the standpoint of appearance and interest to the traveler, developments along the road itself are exactly what is needed.

My idea of a reasonable right-of-way reservation, which would amply protect all the interests of the federal government, is as follows:

Alaska Highway, Other
Primary Roads, and
Secondary Roads 200 feet
Feeder and Branch Roads 100 feet

You mention that the proposal of the department represents a compromise between a recommendation of the Alaska Field Committee and some other unnamed interests. I find it impossible to believe that anyone acquainted with actual conditions in Alaska would recommend a 600-foot right-of-way or anything approaching that dimension. Accordingly, I am sending a copy of this letter to the head of each of the Interior Department agencies in Alaska for comment. When such comments have been received, I will communicate further with you.
