Dear Sir:

I write to acknowledge the receipt of the resolution of the Bannack Commercial Club addressed to me, on the subject of a wagon road from Bannack to Sheep Creek. After consulting with Lewis Cole (Richardson), President of the Board of Road Commissioners, I feel justified in assuring you that preparations will be made in the near future for the beginning of construction of the road in question.

I am aware of the fact that this proposed road is a most meritorious project, and while I think that generally the Board of Road Commissioners should not be advised by this office as to the immediate practicability of carrying out any particular project - since those Commissioners are naturally more fully cognizant of the needs of the Territory and more in the way of road construction than I am - nevertheless in this case of the proposed road from Bannack to Sheep Creek, being now engaged in the work of organizing a new state, I am particularly anxious to have it done at the earliest possible time.

Colonel Richardson informs me that he will address a letter to you on this subject as soon as he receives your petition. To the meantime, I think I am justified in assuring you and your fellow petitioners that although the Road Commission feels constrained to give priority to the completion of the Mendenhall road, a survey of the Sheep Creek route will be made this spring and at least some preliminary work of actual construction accomplished. The pressure from all parts of Alaska for road construction is very great - so much so that the aggregate funds available are relatively small. Colonel Richardson agrees with me, however, the Sheep Creek route is a highly meritorious project, promising somewhat exceptional benefits to the locality and every effort will be made to construct this route as early as possible.
