## A. R. C. Plans Expedition to Chisana

According to first hand information plans are being promulgated by the officials of the A. R. C., that will probably end up with a road being built into the Chisana and eventually into the White River.

Within the next ten days Superintendent Huddleston is expected to order a reconnaissance party into the field, headed by the present engineer of construction at the bridge, Mr. Anderson.

Huddleston is expected to arrive at McCarthy any time to confer as to ways and means.

At present it is expected that if a road were to be started that it would be extended on from the present undertaking, as this route is thought to be a potential factor in the development of more claims than the route from Chitina. Without doubt a road in to Chisana from this point would not only help the placer camp, but would be the means of opening up vast, rich copper properties that are located along the projected route.

# CHISANA WANTS MAIL ROUTE VIA GULKANA

The people in the Chisana, have been trying for some time to establish a route into their camp by way of Chitna and Gulkana, and do away with freighting supplies over the Russell and Boon Glacier from McCarthy. The matter came to a head recently through the efforts of A. S. Johnston the well known mining man of the Chisana, who went over the proposed route and returned thoroughly convinced that it is the only safe and feasible way to get supplies into camp.

While at Gulkana Mr Johnston got other freighters interested and they made the trip to Chisana to see for themselves, with the result that they offered to land freight at Chisana from Chitna for about half what it costs to get it over the Glacier from McCarthy.

The new route runs through a well sheltered and wooded country and is practically water grade all the way with the exception of a low pass between Notch and Cooper creek, there is no danger of being held up by storms anywhere along the route and cabins can be had to camp in every night, something that cannot be said of the Glacier trail, where fierce blizzards are of a common occurrence and where men and dogs are sometimes snowed in
