**From The Agiapuk.**

Judge Ben. L. Miller, recorder of the Agiapuk district, spent several days in Teller last week and kindly accorded a reporter of the News an interview which was inadvertently omitted from our last issue. In speaking of his district the judge said:

"While as yet there has been but very little actual work done on the Agiapuk, in my opinion it will prove to be as good a gold-producing district as the Kougarock or any other in this section of Alaska. So far as surface indications are concerned a minor need not go any farther to find ground which will justify the employment of his time and money in prospecting work.

"The season has been severe, and the many discouragements to be met with at present have not been overcome to the extent they eventually will, although a number of the boys are working away, and the advent of spring will prove something relative to their ground.

"No, of my own knowledge I know absolutely nothing positive about anyone having reached bedrock, nor do I know of any prospects having been found which would justify a stampede. I have heard the same reports you doubtless
