Chapter I-Bureau of Land Fanagement Appendix-Public Land Orders

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By virtue of the authority vested in the President and pursuant to Executive Order No. 9337 of April 24, 1943, it is recred as follows:

ublic Land Order No. 84 of January 26, 1945, and Fut ic Land Order No. 12 of July 20, 1942, a strended by it ic Land Order No. 270 o pril 5, 1945, are nereby revoked.

ubject to valid existing rights, including the rights of tives base on occupancy, and the rovisions of existing withdrawals, the following-described lands are hereby withdrawn under the jurisdiction of the Secretary's the In ar or from all forms of a ropri tion under the public-land laws, including the mining and niners lessing laws, for ight purposes:

(a) A strip of land 500 feet wide, 300 feet on each side of the center line of the aleaka Highway (formerly the Canadian Alaskan Hilitery Highway) as constructed from the Alaska-Yukon Territory boundary to itsjunction with the Bichardson Highway near Hig Delte, Alaska.

(3) A strip of land 600 feet wide, 300 feet on each side of the center line of the Gulkens-Slana-Tok Road as constructed from Tok Junction at about Mile 1319 on the Alaska Highway to the junction with the Richardson Highway near Gulkana, Alaska.

Subject to valid existing rights (including the rights of natives based on occupancy and the provisions of emisting withdrawals), the following-described lands are hereby withdrawn under the jurisdiction of the Secretary of ar from all forms of appropriation under the public-land laws. including the mining and mineral leasing laws, for right-ofway purposes for a telephone line and an oil pipe line with appurtenances:

- (a) A strip of land 50 feet wide, 25 feet on each side of a telephone line as located and constructed generally parallel to the Alaska Highway from the Alaska-Yukon Territory boundary to the junction of the Alaska Highway with the Hichardson Highway near Hig Delta, Alaska.

Subject to valid existing rights, including the rights of natives based on occupancy, and the provisions of existing withdrawals (including the withdrawal of a 60-foot strip along the wlaska-Yukon Territory boundary, made by Proclamation of May 5, 1918, 57 Stat. 1741), the following-described lands are hereby withdrawn from all forms of appropriation under the public-land laws, including the mining and the mineral lessing laws, for classification and survey:

This order whall not otherwise become affective to shange the status of the surveyed or unsurveyed public lands which are not continued withdrawn by this order until 10:00 a. M. OR

At that time, subject to valid existing rights (including the rights of the United States to any lands containing improvements owned by it, and the rights of natives based on occupancy), and the provisions of them existing withdrawels, the unsurveyed lands shall become subject to settlement, and other forms of appropriation in accordance with the appropriate laws and regulations, and the surveyed lands shall become subject to application, petition, location, or selection as follows:
