SUBJECT: Authorization to Research ARC/BPR/FWHA Documents located in Federal Records Center

Due to pending and possible future litigation regarding the justification and location of several Rights of Way conveyed from the Federal government to the State of Alaska, we are requesting a letter of authorization from FHWA in order to allow us to review and copy documents located at the Seattle branch of the National

Archives/Federal Records Center which are still under the legal

custody of FHWA. The bulk of the records in question were transmitted to the Federal Records Center on August 11, 1961 and consist of the inactive records of the Alaska Road Commission and Bureau of Public Roads including closed projects, case files, plan and profile drawings, annual reports, correspondence, fiscal records, etc. from 1920 to 1958 and FHWA records after 1958.

Once the records have made the transition to the National Archives they are open for review by the general public, however as long as they remain in the Federal Records Center, a letter of authorization from the legal custodian is required before access is allowed.

Perhaps a general letter of authorization can be provided such that we could submit a copy of it with our requests for research and document copies. My contact at the National Archives is:

Dear Joyce,

As we discussed over the phone on 9-22-88, this letter represents my first request for copies of specific documents held for the Federal Highway Administration in the Federal Records Center. Please find attached a letter of authorization from the Juneau office of FHWA for access to documents that have not been transferred out of their custody. In order to facilitate the recovery of specific documents I will submit with each request a highlighted copy of a page of the transmittal from FHWA to the Federal Records Center indicating which documents from which boxes should be copied. According to the information I received from you when I visited your office back in March of 1988, the main group of FHWA documents were transmitted on August 11, 1961 and is referenced as Record group 30 and Accession no. 62-A78.

#### Davis Road

The first set of documents we are interested in relate to a road built in Fairbanks between 1950 and 1952 under the Local Farm Road Program now known as Davis Road. Specifically we are looking for a document which would establish the date of construction. Attached are a cover sheet and eight pages of the FHWA transmittal with sixteen documents highlighted which may shed some light on the status of the Local Farm Road program during that period. Please recover and copy those documents.

#### Ester Dome Road

There is only one document of potential interest relating to this road. The highlighted transmittal sheet is attached.

Unless you require payment for copying before you can send the documents, please send the invoice with the documents and it will be paid promptly. Thank you for your help.

#### RESEARCH ROOM INFORMATION

Please sign the Research Room Register each day.

Use the lockers and coat racks outside the research room for brief-cases and personal belongings. Researchers using textual records may bring nothing to the work table except writing tools and paper or note cards. Items brought into the research room are subject to search.

Agency Records: Records that have not been transferred to the legal custody of the National Archives are controlled by the agency that created them and stored in the Records Center. Researchers must obtain the agency's approval prior to review. Please allow 3 to 4 hours to work requests into the Records Center's daily schedule.

Archival Records: A Researcher Identification Card is required to use records that are in the legal custody of the National Archives of the United States. You will be asked to accept personal responsibility by signing a reference service order to be countersigned by the room attendant during your exit interview. Please notify the attendant or other staff of your departure and plans, if any, to return. Be sure a staff member knows if you have tabbed records for copying (see below).

Records are not to be marked, rearranged, or handled in any way likely to cause damage. We reserve the right to limit the number of boxes provided to a researcher at one time.

Archival Reproduction Orders: Records to be reproduced should be tagged properly and returned to the appropriate folder and box. Tagged documents must be listed on a reproduction order sheet. Ask the research room attendant for assistance. Photocopying costs 35 cents per page (50 cents for records still in the legal custody of one of the U.S. District Courts). Certification is available at \$2.00 per certification. We will not attempt to copy records if, in our judgment, they could be damaged thereby.

The Paul Kohl Research Room is open to the public between 7:45 a.m. and 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday (excepting Federal holidays) and one Tuesday evening (5-9) and one Saturday afternoon (12-4) per month. A list of dates follows. Records to be used during evenings and weekends must be staged by 4 p.m. Tuesday and Friday, respectively.

The Document Security Zone for textual researchers is located on the east (left, lighted) side of the research room. Other researchers are asked to stay in the Microfilm Reading Zone.

Rest rooms and water fountains are in the northwest corner of the research room.

No food, drink or smoking are permitted in the research room. There is a designated smoking area in the lobby.

There is no public cafeteria in the building, but there are vending machines and a snack area upstairs, and benches are provided outside. A deli, across the street, has sandwiches, cold drinks, coffee and snacks. There are no other restaurants within walking distance of the Archives.

A public telephone is located in the lobby for use by researchers. Federal regulations prohibit the use of government telephones for other than government business.

## SPECIAL NOTES ON DOCUMENT HANDLING

Records used in the research room of the Pacific Northwest Branch of the National Archives are unique records. To protect their integrity, researchers are required to:

Maintain records in their existing order within their box, envelope, or folder.

Use records from only one container (box, envelope, or folder) at a time.

Replace file units in the same order and facing the same direction as they were received. If the records seem to be in disarray, notify the reference archivist who helped you.

Leave the green-coloured NA Form 14001 (Reference Service Slip) attached to the container.

Return records to the reference archivist who assisted you when research is complete.

Use only pencil or ball-point pen in the research room.

Take notes away from documents to prevent damage to the records. Notepaper is never placed on the documents for note-taking.

Do not use your writing instrument as a "pointer" when reading.

Do not make any marks or notations on the records. Return all loose paper records to their containers when leaving the research table. Do not leave documents exposed to the light when taking a break.

Attached are fourteen pages of documents dating from 1928 to 1937 that I pulled from the Alaska Road Commission (ARC) file titled "Chisana SP-1". Other than the ARC annual reports, these were the only relevant documents relating to the Chisana Airport that I was able to locate at the Federal Records Center in Seattle.

Chisana Airport was given the ARC designation of "54A" and referenced in each ARC Annual Report that I reviewed from 1930 to 1937.

The 1930 report noted that \$1,494.63 was spend for the air field construction. Also noted was that the project was "entirely supported by Territorial funds", "The area was cleared of large stones and leveled, proper markers were placed" and "This landing field, 150 ft. by 1000 ft., is located just north of the Village of Chisana.". The report also stated that a detailed description could be found in the 1929 annual report, however that report was missing from the records.

The 1931 report noted \$250 spent for maintenance and improvements. The following reports to 1937 did not report any additional construction or maintenance.

Hopefully this information will be of some value.
