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REDUCING WITHDRAWAL OF PUBLIC LANDS ALONG ALANKA RIGHWAY AND OPENING RELEASED LANDS TO SETTLEMENT AND OTHER PORMS OF PERSONALIZATION

By virtue of the authority vested in ithe President and pursuant to Executive Order No. 9337 of April 24, 1943, it is ordered as follows:

(a) Ninety-day period for preferenceright flings. For a period of 90 days from October 2, 1947, to December 31, 1947, inclusive, the surveyed public lands affected by this order shall be subject to (1) application under the homestead laws or the small tract act of June 1. 1938 (52 Stat. 609, 42 U. Veterans shall accompany their applications with certified copies of their certificates of discharge, or other satisfactory evidence of their military or naval service. Persons asserting preference rights, through settlement or otherwise, and those having equitable claims, shall accompany their applications by duly corroborated affidavits in support thereof, setting forth in defail all facts relevant to their claims.

Applications for these lands, which shall be filed in the proper discrete land office. (at Pairbanks of Anchorage, Alaka), shall be noted upon in accord-

ance with the regulations contained in § 295.8 of Title 43 of the Code of Pederal Regulations (Circular No. 324, May 22, 1914, 43 L. D. 254). Applications under the homestead laws shall be governed by the regulations contained in Parts 65 and 66 of Title 43 of the Code of Pederal Regulations and applications under the small tract act of June 1, 1938, shall be governed by the regulations contained in Part 257 of that title.

Very little of the land restored by this order has been surveyed. The major part of the area is of a character unsuitable for agricultural purposes.
