It was prepared under a Reimbursable Services Agreement between this office and the Public Access and Assertion Defense Section of the Division of Mining, Land and Water. The report is an in depth history of mining and trail use in the Coldfoot-Caro-Chandalar areas from the 1890s to the present. The study was conducted in support of litigation between the State of Alaska and the U.S. Department of Interior, Bureau of Land Management over Right-of-Ways on historic trails and roads originating from Section RS 2477 of the 1867 Mining Act (43U.S.C Section 932, repealed with saving clause). The parties to this litigation reached a settlement, which was agreed to by U.S. District Court Judge Ralph R. Beistline on January 9, 2007, in which the State of Alaska has received a public right-of-way 60 feet wide along the common routes of the Coldfoot to Caro Trail (RST 262) and the Coldfoot to Chandalar Lake Trail (RST 9).

Thank you for allowing me to do research in your office files and for generously sharing the time of members of your staff during my research last summer.
